AMERICA'S CUP DRIBBLETH OVER A BIT

The winter of 85 has been reasonably productive for our beach. In May, the Nedlands City Council invited submissions from beach user groups concerning its plans for upgrading Swanbourne beach. Subsequently they received a joint proposal from the Surf Club, shop proprietors, Naturalists Club (environmental interests) and of course the free beach folk, ie. myself and Arthur. The Council was impressed and accepted our plans as their own. The plan caters for all, ie. Surf Club, shop, nudists and textilers with concern for the environment, residents and costs. I believe it is a bloody great plan. Funding was to come from the Community Employment Programme (\$66,000), America's Cup Committee (\$177,000) and City of Nedlands (\$75,000).

Then in August the local residents had their two bobs worth. At an electors meeting, they rejected anything connected with nudists, particularly the new car park. The Council however continued with the plan but to appease local residents, the toilet block was omitted (see item 11 on the plan). The residents were more than slightly miffed.

On advice from the Dept. of Conservation and Environment, The Council is constructing an experimental dune on the textile beach to stop sand blowing over the car park. It is cheaper and more efficient than raising

the limestone retaining wall (see item 2). The Surf Club will get a new ramp (designed to prevent sand build up) and more parking (items 1 and 3). The shop gets a revamped frontage (item 4) with paving, grassed areas for tables and chairs and a low limestone wall to protect the grass from too much sand and feet. The shop proprietors will also build a pergola for shade. Paths will be consolidated with crushed limestone (items 6 and 7). The untidy slope behind the shop and Club will be shored up with a 2.0m wall and replanting on the reduced slope (item 9).

The most important is item 5, the new car park with over 200 bays, behind and 2.5m below, the oval. It can't be seen from the houses, does not intrude on the dunes and will solve most of the parking problems in nearby streets. It is closer to the free beach so grumbling textilers may yet get a spot at their beach. So the nudists, residents and textilers all benefit. We didn't get toilets and showers but I will be continuing to fight for them. A popular beach without facilities would not be tolerated elsewhere. My belief has always been that we are taxpaying citizens, the same as other beach users and therefore deserve equal consideration in facilities and in the distribution of public recreational funds. In fact we do far more for our beach than textile users do elsewhere. Others use a beach but contribute nothing.

Also on the drawing board is a \$1.5 million "Fairway Buoy Yacht Club" (without yachts) to be built above the Surf Club boathouse. Catering for rich tourists, it will have a large viewing lounge, bar, pool, and spa and private 'boxes' for viewing the Cup trials at \$40,000 each! Get your order in now, folks. After the Cup the Surf Club will inherit the lot including, presumably, the liquor licence. The residents were again, not amused. The new Club will mostly use a limosine taxi service for members but some beach parking may be used as well as a helipad on the oval.

So the Cup has supplied incentive and funds. I feel quite sure the "Club" and the beach development will all go ahead. The America's Cup funding is now reduced to \$100,000 max.

PHOTOGRAPHS

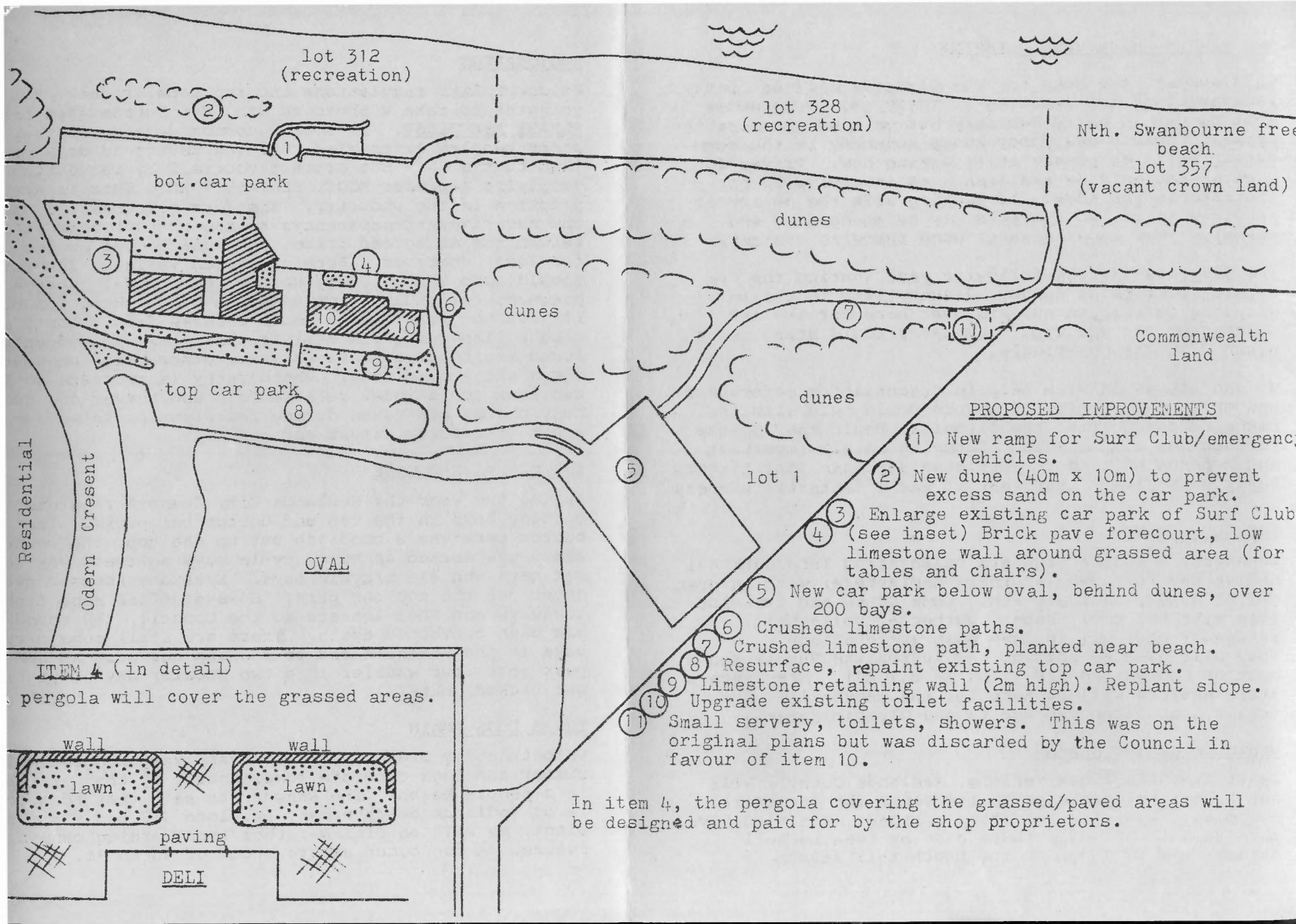
We don't like regulations and red tape, right? But when you want to take a photo at Nth. Swanbourne free beach, PLEASE ASK FIRST. It's only common decency to respect other peoples lifestyles. If you decide to do a session then that's OK. But protect yourself by requesting or supplying a proper MODEL RELEASE FORM. This is standard practice in the industry. The form releases the use of the negatives/transparencys to the photographer in return for an agreed price, eg. money, free photos or for love, whatever. Each situation varies. The form should also indicate whether you as a model approve the pictures for publication and with whom. Have fun but if your not sure, use a model release form. Don't get caught like two girls earlier this year who suddenly found their innocent faces (plus other bits) on post-cards all around town. Photography is my trade so I can show you a model release form and answer any queries. Many photos are taken during the Olympics so we expect a bit of decorum, trust and respect.

THE CAR PARK BUNGLE

During the year the Nedlands City Council repainted the parking bays in the top and bottom car parks. The bottom park was a good job but up the top, the roundabout was marked as motor cycle bays so there was 103 car bays and 114 m/cycle bays. Everyone knows m/cycles never use the top car park. However after some fines, towaways and rude letters to the Council, the roundabout has been converted again. There are still some m/cycle bays at the southern end of the top car park so don't park your four wheeler in a two wheeler bay or you'll get nicked, mate!
